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End of an Era for Army Apprentices

Army College of TAFE Journal 1995

END OF AN ERA FOR ARMY • APPRENTICES

Saturday the 8th April 1995 saw the end of an era with the last parade of the Army Apprentices Battalion held at the Army College of TAFE, Bonegilla. Almost 300 staff and apprentices were on parade to commemorate the cessation of the Army Apprenticeship Scheme and the introduction of the Army Technical and Trade Scheme. The parade was attended by a number of senior officers as well as almost 2000 ex-apprentices and their families.

The weekend festivities began with a cocktail party and a reunion for ex-apprentices on the Friday night followed by the Apprentice Battalion Parade on the Saturday. The parade was reviewed by the GOC TRG COMD MAJGEN S.N. Gower, AM. The band was formed by ex-apprentice musicians from all over Australia and despite only having minimal time to prepare, performed to an exceptional standard. After the parade the College of TAFE was open for visitors to view the training facilities and the RAEME TRG Centre provided a display of Vehicles, Weapons and Equipment.

After reviewing the parade MAJGEN Gower paid tribute to the more than 6000 apprentices who had graduated from the scheme. MAJGEN Gower said that the apprentices from both the school at Balcombe and Bonegilla had achieved and maintained a very high standard in both military and technical skills. This achievement is highlighted by over 400 apprentices who had gone on to achieve commissioned officer status. He said that army apprentices had been the backbone of our ever increasingly technical army by maintaining the mobility and fire-power of our land forces. Our soldier technicians who have been trained under the apprenticeship scheme have always provided effective support to our forces regardless of where they were deployed and in most cases in very trying conditions.

MAJGEN Gower explained that due to reforms in civilian training combined with changing societal trends the army was no longer able to recruit enough capable personnel through the existing apprenticeship scheme. This has led to the introduction of the new scheme which will give the army a much larger pool of applicants from which to choose. MAJGEN Gower stressed that the standards set by past apprentices would not be diminished in any way under the new scheme and that all graduates would be more than capable of carrying on in the footsteps of their predecessors.

MAJGEN Gower also congratulated the 49th apprentice class which graduated from apprentices to trainees. MAJGEN Gower complimented the trainees on their achievements to date and stated that as the last apprentice class it was their responsibility to carry on the apprentice traditions which have served the defence force so well over the past 47 years.

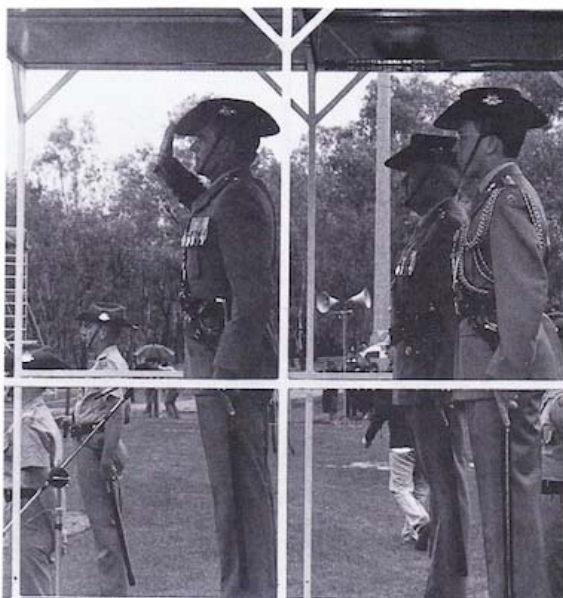
The Army Apprentices School was established in 1948 at Balcombe, some 70 km from Melbourne on the Mornington Peninsula. On the 20th August 1948, the Minister for the Army, the Honourable Cyril Chambers, MP, officially opened the school.

The first intake of apprentices numbered 63 and they received instruction in eleven different trades. Since 1948 over 6000 apprentices have graduated from the college and some 400 of

these have subsequently gained commissioned rank as army officers.

The last graduation parade at Balcombe was held in December 1982. The school then moved to the current location at Latchford Barracks Bonegilla.

On the 1st January 1991 the Army Apprentices School was renamed the Army College of Technical and Further Education to more accurately reflect the expanding role of the college to include pre and post vocational training for adult trainees.

The Reunion commenced with the now familiar Registration and Meet and Greet (M&G) function, in the Albury Entertainment Centre. Attendees were welcomed by the familiar friendly faces of Jeff and Jan Heron, who have been the welcoming party at numerous previous reunions. Attendees were given their show-bags containing a "Welcome to Albury" kit courtesy of the Albury Information Centre, the Reunion program and mugs & stubby holders for gentlemen and an inscribed plate for the ladies. Mugs from a previous reunion were offered as 'extras' and were eagerly snapped up. The M&G was very convivial and attendees soon gravitated into their intake groups. Brian and Barbara Daley did a roaring trade on the raffle sales whilst Richard Pike also had a strong demand for AAAA Memorabilia. The RAEME representatives were present to provide attendees the opportunity to purchase the recently released Corps History Book. When it came to the formalities and some attendees continued their own conversations, they were smartly brought into line by the Albury City Mayor who had a voice any RSM would be proud of. The response that was received when attendees were advised that the intake signs for the Saturday morning's Street Parade were to be returned after the Parade indicated that it was highly unlikely many would ever be seen again, let alone returned. A number were seen again at subsequent Reunion events over the weekend as rallying points for various intakes. By now, I'm sure they are scattered far and wide around Australia.

Saturday morning began with the AGM, which was very well attended. There was some initial concern that the AGM might run over-time and impact on the Street Parade. However, the AGM finished early, as I suspect attendees really did not want to miss the Parade. The Parade was led by the Australian Light Horse Association riders followed by the Australian National Flag, the Army Apprentices School flag and the flags of RAE, RASIGS and RAEME, being the three Corps that received most graduating Apprentices. When it was announced at the M&G the previous evening that transport for those unable to march could not be organised, the Mayor stepped in and offered to arrange suitable transport and assured us that one or two vehicles would be available next morning. A convoy of five vintage jeeps appeared for the Parade and provided transport for those unable to march. Once the intake signs were distributed, the attendees decided that they were going to march by individual intakes, rather than in four contingents as had been planned.

The Army Band Kapooka attended the Parade and provided excellent marching music to help everyone to keep in step. As the marchers came past the saluting dais, where LTCOL Andrew Hodgkinson, the last CO/CI of the Army College of TAFE took the salute, it was very evident that everyone was extremely proud to be marching behind their individual intake signs – their backs were straight, chests were puffed out and heads held high.

In the afternoon, Reunion attendees had the opportunity to visit Latchford Barracks to view the trade wings and today's training methods. I understand from various attendees that these visits went very well.

On the Saturday evening, it was off to the Commercial Club Albury for the Reunion Dinner, which was attended by over three hundred people. A number of people subsequently said to me that, on entering the room, their first thought was – WOW! The décor of the room combined with the table settings were excellent and indicative of a very good night ahead. Many attendees also advised me they thought the meal was excellent.

The placemats designed by Jeff Heron were also a big hit and provided a memorable souvenir of the night. The Army Band Kapooka provided an ensemble, which played light music for the dinner, greatly appreciated by all.





LTCOL Hodgkinson provided his reflections on what it was like to bring the Army Apprentice era to a close, and provided numerous anecdotes including the significance of the Duntroon Bell to the last Crab Night. The last RSM, WO1 Brian Hatfield, in his reflections of 1995, addressed as to how he handled the matter of the Duntroon Bell that appeared at Latchford Bks that night and that, later, as the RSM at Duntroon, he kept a very close eye on the Bell.



The Sunday morning began with a very moving Memorial Service at the Australian Army Apprentices Memorial at Gaza Ridge Barracks led by Rev Alan Kelb OAM. The Service was followed by a visit to the Army Museum Bandiana and an excellent BBQ lunch provided by Redback Mobile BBQ.



Our Trustee Jim Hislop's response and Requiem included an excellent reference to a poem "The Dash" by Linda Ellis. The dash is the "very important" small mark between one's dates of birth and of death.

Based on the feedback received, all enjoyed themselves immensely and were able to catch up with old friends and also to make some new ones. The weekend must have been a success, as I didn't get any "pokes in the chest"! Overall, the weekend is best summed up by one response received, "I am sure everybody who attended had a great time and those that didn't make the effort are the poorer for not attending."

In closing, I would like to pay tribute and say thank you to the whole organising committee, but especially to Jeff and Jan Heron, Richard Pike and Rev Alan Kelb OAM who all contributed enormously, both before and during the Reunion itself, to help make it the success that it was.

On 21st - 22nd October in Albury, the 10th Intake celebrated 60 years from first marching into Balcombe, immediately preceding the National Reunion, with 24 attending from all states (except WA) and NZ. It is an eye opener to realise that a known 41 of our Intake are no longer

With Skill and Fighting - Craftsmen of the Australian Army 1942-2014

RAEME history book launch, Jeff Heron, 21st Radio Mech, Editor with input from Harry Cole, 7th VM

The new RAEME Corps history book was launched at the Australian War Memorial (AWM) on 9th September 2015. The event followed the regular AWM Last Post Ceremony, which included a reading by MAJ Ian Cook, RAEME, son of the late Clyde Cook. The reading featured WW1 soldier LCPL Hector Merton Cornish, 31st Bn, who died of wounds in France on 13th March 1917, aged 21. Ian's mother Heather also attended the event. The Ceremony included the laying of a number of wreaths, with Des Kiernan representing RAEME. It was all quite professionally done and in perfect weather.



The Book Launch was held in the AWM Courtyard Gallery and was well co-ordinated by Head of Corps RAEME (and AAAA Patron) BRIG Andrew Mathewson, and BRIG (retd) Ross Grant who was the Project Manager and major driving force behind the very successful production of the book. An amazing number of serving RAEME officers (including Reserves) holding the ranks of MAJ, LTCOL, COL and BRIG were at the AWM ceremony and book launch – as there had been a RAEME Corps Seminar on the same day. It was a good chance to talk to them and, in some cases, renew friendships with a lot of the retirees also attending.

Ross Grant reports that the launch of the Corps history book “was a very successful event. It was a wonderful evening, regardless of whether you were participating, or a member of the audience of some 150 plus enjoying the hospitality provided. Chief of Army (LTGEN Angus Campbell, DSC, AM) made a most appropriate speech and told the gathered Bluebells what he really thought of the Corps – most generous in his praise – and an excellent choice of person to launch the book. I am extremely grateful for everyone's support and assistance throughout, especially those who provided me with the occasional 'morale boosting talk' during the journey! I understand there are a few folks who are yet to receive their books, but they will come – the HOC is doing its best with limited resources. If you haven't ordered your book and wish to do so, please don't delay – it is unlikely that further books will be printed.”

Harry Cole estimates that perhaps 50% of the senior officers attending were from the latter intakes of Army Apprentices. Harry also reports that he was fortunate to meet up with some of the previous members from 101 Fd Wksp and HQ 2EME Gp, with whom he had lost contact some years ago.

Eligibility via DVA

As a former member of Australia's Defence Force, you may be eligible to claim compensation for any medical condition related to your service. If your condition is related to service prior to 1 July 2004, support is available under the Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 1988 (SRCA), Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986 (VEA) or Defence Act 1903. If your condition is related to service on or after 1 July 2004, support is available under the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004 (MRCA). Please seek out the advice of a trained advocate, via one of the many ex-service organisations, to assist you in the process.
