All project SPAASSM material has now been removed from the AWM and handed over to the Army Museum Bandiana on 7 Aug 2010. Assessment of the video material is being undertaken by Peter Thornton.

Publishing the Project SPAASSM images on the website will be the next major activity. However progress may be slower than what we might have hoped due to amount of work required.

## Balcombe Marine Gates Project

Some twelve months back our Patron Lt Gen Ken Gillespie suggested that the Association may like to coordinate some form of commemoration of the service history of the Balcombe/Mt. Martha area, as he suspected that it had significant military importance. Our Heritage Officer, Geoff Martin was tasked for this.

The Peninsula Council was contacted for their support which was given and contact officer nominated. VicRoads have also been contacted and advised of our proposal.

The Army History Unit, through Lt Gen Gillespie provided a very detailed history and list of units. This history surprised everyone in that the area had been used prior to Federation and by a range of units from all three services including such notable units as Z Special Force, the raising of two brigades for WWII, Clandestine Training School, as well as being the initial site of the Armoured and Signals Centres and many more units.

On 29<sup>th</sup> April, the Apprentice Association invited all interested parties to meet at Balcombe to consider the best way to develop the site. As the area immediately behind the left wall and leading onto Mace Oval is already flat and grassed and has two tables and benches, toilets and a rubbish point, it was agreed that a Rest Area” should be developed with facilities for unit plaques and history boards. A plan of action was agreed to by all interested parties and will focus on the following:

- The walls, gates and Marine plaques should be refurbished, including replacement of the original plaques now held at Mt Martha House.
- Some form of recognition of Mick Mace be linked with Mace Oval
- Approach to Balcombe Grammar School to see if they would like to be involved and be “caretakers” of the site.
- Units contacted to determine if they would like a unit board or just be included as part of the general history.
- I US Marine Division contacted to determine their involvement
- Approach Army History Unit for assistance
- Relocation of plaques from Citation Oval to this area.
- Nominations for suggestions for a name for the site.
- Approach Rotary to see if they can assist with the construction of a shelter/BBQ/table structure that will also house the unit plaques and history board.

These will not all happen overnight and it is estimated that it will be 2012 before the dedication can take place. This would also be a great occasion and location for reunions!!

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## Army Apprentice Memorial

The Memorial at Bandiana continues to be developed with only the Memorial Wall behind the gates to be built. This wall will silhouette the gates and provide a repository for the ashes of Apprentices and their partners

Many thanks to all who included a contribution to the Memorial fund with their last membership fees; we have some very generous Apprentices out there.

### Memorial Plaques

Memorial plaques may now be placed on the respective school wall (Balcombe or Bonegilla). It would be appreciated if members could make it known to mates and the next of kin of departed Apprentices of the facility to mount a remembrance plaque on the walls. Details can be found in the web site.

### Memorial Wall

Soon to be completed - the Memorial Wall will hold ashes of Apprentices and their partners. In these days of high funeral costs this represents a saving of at least \$3000 over a burial and has the assurance of perpetual care and of being remembered by all Apprentices visiting the site. An appropriate ceremony will be arranged for each interment. Details will be on the web site.

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## **LOST & FOUND**

### **Lost "Crab Day" memorial**

This is a plea for help in locating the whereabouts of the "Crab Day" memorial that was dedicated to the two 21st Intake Apprentices (P.K. Russell and A.J.T. (Jo) Pearce) who lost their lives on Crab Day 1968. As far as can be remembered, there was a flag pole, a small gun and a plaque erected between two of the (then) C Coy huts near the top of the road that led to the northern end of the Parade Ground.

It appears that the memorial was disassembled during the move to Bonegilla in 1982/3 and that the plaque was relocated to the stairwell at C Coy HQ at Latchford Barracks. It was last seen around 1994. Current evidence are the four holes where the screws were on that stairwell, but there is no trace of the plaque. Anyone who can remember what happened to the plaque after 1994, or can shed any light on its whereabouts, is requested to contact any member of the Committee. You may remain anonymous if you wish.

## APPRENTICES' TRADE PROFICIENCY PRIZE MEDAL

A recent enquiry from a lady who came across one of the Medals caused the Association Committee to conduct some basic research into the origins of the Medal. Images of a Medal awarded to Mal Cock, 12th Intake, have been on the Association Website for some time.



Anecdotally, and from some documents, evidence is that the Medals were awarded for excellence in trade progress, sport, regimental training, and qualities of leadership. The Medals were awarded annually, at least from 1956 to 1979 and were awarded to junior, intermediate and senior intakes. In some years, there may have been only one Medal awarded per trade per intake and, in other years, two Medals (silver and bronze) were awarded. The Medals were engraved with the winner's name, the year and the type of award.

The obverse features the Apprentices' badge (less the scroll and with the "King's" crown). Two Commonwealth stars are balanced either side of the crown. The reverse includes a laurel wreath and the words "AWARDED TO" towards the top of the wreath and the maker's name "STOKES" at the bottom. The recipient's name (and sometimes regimental number and/or year or class) are separately engraved in the centre of the wreath (along with the award type at the top).

This is by no means a final or complete description of the Medal. Anyone with further evidence to support or expand the description is encouraged to contact the Committee.
