Our new President

Regimental number 342976, Apprentice Barry Edward Minster joined the Army as a 20th Intake Apprentice Radio Mechanic in January 1965. After three years at Balcombe, Barry graduated with the rest of his Class and was posted to the School of Signals - also at Balcombe - for six months Corps training to complete his apprenticeship.

As an RA Signals Corps member, Barry served with the 1st Signal Regiment in Ingleburn NSW, and then applied for Vietnam service. He completed jungle training in Canungra in February 1969 and arrived in South Vietnam on 2nd April 1969, posted to 110th Signal Squadron. As a highly skilled technician, his duties included System Control Officer in Saigon and, after six months, he was promoted to Lance Corporal. Reaching his end of duty, he was offered a second stripe to extend his tour of duty to 19 months; this he did and returned home in October 1970 after 576 days overseas.



His posting back to the School of Signals was short-lived and Barry successfully resigned his Army contract in July 1971. On discharge, Barry commenced employment in the broadcast television world with RVN2 Wagga Wagga, where he married his first wife Lynn Ballantyne. They travelled to Scotland where he worked with Scottish television 1973-1975. Barry returned to Australia as a proud father and commenced work with numerous local television companies: HSV7, ABC2, SBS, and ATV0.

Retiring from full time work in 1996, Barry has been involved with several Olympic Games broadcasts, World Cup Soccer and Tennis championships. He enjoys computers, especially social media.

Barry's other love is Freemasonry and you can find him being involved with Victorian Masonic Lodges as well as directing the live streaming of Freemasonry every month on the Internet as well as the Channel 31 program "*Inside Freemasonry*". Although he likes Rolls Royces, his toys only extend to a 1966 MGB as well as a new VW Polo GTI. Barry and his second wife Judith live in Collingwood, Melbourne.

SPAASSM Collection DVD

In late 2006, Peter Thornton (35th ET) discovered a large quantity of photographic material and documents relating to the AAS, from both Balcombe and Bonegilla, at the Army Museum, Bandiana Vic, including photographs, slides, negatives, video tapes, movie films, journals, graduation booklets, standing orders, handbooks and histories. About 16 boxes 600mm x 500mm x 400mm and four smaller boxes were stored on shelves in an old warehouse. The material was in good condition but the storage location was less than ideal. The Army History Unit owns the material. Lt Col Jim Hislop (Rtd) had rescued the items from almost certain destruction at the closing of the Schools at Balcombe and Bonegilla. This material was relocated from Bandiana to the Australian War Memorial in Canberra. After a detailed survey, the SPAASSM team assessed that the archive contained 7300 photos, 750 x 35 mm slides, 30 videos, 1 film, and about 10,000 pages of documents.

Peter decided that, to be preserved, the material needed to be surveyed, digitised, catalogued and put into archival standard storage. The longer term outcome and aim is to make the digitised material publicly available via the Web for the general enjoyment of all Apprentices and visitors and to eventually make more complete the catalogue record for each item. Because of the size of the task, he realised a formal approach would be necessary to acquire the necessary resources. Peter developed project proposals, ToRs and all necessary documentation to get the project started. Finally, in early 2007 Project SPAASSM, (*Special Project for Army Apprentice School Special Material*) was established by the AAAA with the generous support of (the then) Chief of Army, Lt Gen Ken Gillespie, AO DSC CSM. Peter was appointed Project Manager and a project team set up, consisting of: a **core group** including: Peter Thornton (35th ET), Ian Morris (12th RM), Frank Poole (10th Architectural Draughtsman) and Bill Mertin (22nd VM); and a **variable group** including, from time to time: Chris Moon (32nd C&J), Rod Eagleton (24th F&T), Chic Henry (19th Blacksmith), Ray Dawes (21st F&T) and Ian MacLean (22nd Musician).

Archival storage materials were purchased and the items moved from Bandiana to the Australian War Memorial, which provided space for the work. Over the next three years, Project SPAASSM transformed the miscellaneous assortment of photos, slides, and documents etc into the "AAAA Inc Historical Collection" (archivally stored items, digital images on DVD, a catalogue written in MS Access 2007, and accompanying documentation).

Peter continued in the role of Project Manager until ill health forced him to stand down in 2009. Ian Morris took over until completion of the Project. On 5 May 2010, a function was held at the AWM to officially mark the end of the Project. The Collection was handed over to The Army Museum Bandiana on 7 Aug 2010 where it is now stored.

Work is underway to make the digitised images available on the revamped AAAA Inc Website and copies of the material on DVD may be purchased via the Merchandise section on the Website.

Harry Hoger (20th RM) has supplied information regarding the establishment of the Defence Honours and Awards Appeals Tribunal, via which: a) an individual is able to directly seek review by the Tribunal about their eligibility for a Defence honour or award but only after an application has been refused by Defence, and b) the Government is able to refer general eligibility issues relating to Defence honours and awards to the Tribunal for inquiry and recommendation. Trades

9,297 young men and women enlisted into the Australian Army to serve as Army Apprentices. There were 1781 non-graduates, including 24 Apprentices who died whilst at AAS. Of the non-graduates, 446 went on to serve in the Regular Army.

7,516 Apprentices graduated into the following trades: Architectural Draughtsman - 12, Blacksmith - 61, Bricklayer - 52, Carpenter and Joiner - 781, Clerk - 120, Electrical Fitter - 335, Electrical Mechanic - 365, Electrician - 88, Fitter and Turner - 1214, Musician - 385, Plumber - 287, Radio Mechanic/ Electronic Tradesman - 1584 Vehicle Mechanic - 2224, Welder - 8.

Female Apprentices

There were 115 female Army Apprentices, of whom 49 did not graduate. 66 female Apprentices graduated into the following trades: Electronics - 32, Vehicle Mechanic - 28, Fitter and Turner - 5, Carpentry - 1. One is now a Major, two are Captains and four have reached WO2.



Operational service

Many Army Apprentices have participated on overseas operational service, both warlike and non-warlike, some serving on multiple operations. The number of individual Apprentices who have partaken in all these operations totals 2563: Afghanistan - 288, Bougainville - 255, Borneo - 198, Sinai - 29, Iraq - 227, Korea - 34, Malaya - 271, Middle East - 18, Balkans - 8, Rhodesia - 5, Rwanda - 40, Solomon Islands - 94, Somalia - 43, Thailand - 10, Thai/Malay Border - 30, Timor - 678, Pakistan - 7, Cambodia - 138, Namibia - 131, Vietnam - 1125, (includes 71 non-graduates), Western Sahara - 12, Ethiopia - 2, Mozambique - 3, Sudan - 2, and Kashmir - 3.

Officers and Warrant Officers

There have been 765 Apprentices who have reached officer rank. This includes 34 non-graduates. There have also been six padres, 719 WO1s and 760 WO2s. 382 Apprentices graduated from OCS/RMC/ADFA. In the higher ranks there have been: 1 x Lieutenant General, 5 x Brigadiers, 21 x Colonels and 113 x Lieutenant Colonels.

Still serving

As of today¹, only 527 Apprentices remain in uniform - 330 in the ARA and 197 in the ARES. Oldest serving in the ARES are Lt Col Ian McLean, Maj Robert Hudson and Maj Rodney Cox, all 22nd Intake. In the ARA it's WO1 Brian Bosworth and WO1 Greg Payne, both 25th.

SASR

There have been 74 Apprentices who have qualified to wear the SAS beret.

Movie review “The Railway Man” (by Frank Poole)

The Railway Man is adapted from the bestselling autobiography of the experiences of Eric Lomax (played by Colin Firth) as a Signaller in the British Army, captured by the Japanese in Singapore and sent to work on the infamous Burma Railway. Although there are many “flash-backs” to his life and mistreatment in the Burma Railway camps, particularly after owning up to having built a radio, the film is located in England in the later post-war period.

The focus of the story is on the effect of Lomax’s treatment in the hands of the Japanese Kempeitai, particularly Lt. Takashi Nagase (played by Takashi Nagase) and the effect on his life, his fixation on railway timetables and on his relationship with his wife Patti (Nicole Kidman). Many will recognise the classic symptoms of PTSD, including the suicide of a fellow Burma prisoner from his support group.

With the support of his best friend Finlay and his wife, and with increasing psychological trauma, he finally agrees to return to the Burma Railway site where he finds his tormentor Takashi Nagase, now the curator of the Burma Railway museum. He attacks Nagase but cannot kill him as he intended and returns to England to collect Patti and take her back with him to make peace with Nagase and settle his demons.

For those who have difficulty explaining PTSD, this film graphically illustrates the greatly misunderstood effect of war on the mind and the flow-on effect to friends and family. A film well worth seeing.
