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The Army Museum, Bandiana

This impressive army display museum together with the Australian Army Apprentices Memorial and the RAEME Craftsman Memorial are located inside Gaza Ridge Barracks at South Bandiana. Four kilometres from Wodonga along the Murray Valley Highway, it is almost directly opposite the old RAEME Training Centre.

The Museum is open only on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 10.00 to 15.00. It is closed on Sundays, Good Friday and Easter Monday, Anzac Day, and from Christmas Eve until New Year's Day (inclusive).

Entry costs: Family: \$10.00 (2 adults and 3 children U/16yrs); Adult: \$5.00, Pensioner: \$2.00; Group of 10 or more: \$2.00 per person.

Unfortunately, due to the current security arrangements for entry to all Defence establishments, there is a procedure you must follow if you are planning a visit. **At least 24 hours prior to your planned visit, you need to either phone, fax or e-mail the Museum representative** with a list of the names of who will be visiting (including any bus drivers), along with the date of the visit and the time you will be arriving. A visit to any of the memorials opposite the museum is dependent on an escort being available from the Museum staff at the time. **Note also** that the BBQ area opposite the Museum is not currently available for public use.

Long Tan Cross, Nui Dat

The Long Tan Cross can be found in Ba Ria, Vung Tau Province, about 110 km south-east of Ho Chi Minh City. It marks the site of the Battle of Long Tan, Australia's most costly engagement of the Vietnam War, which resulted in the loss of 18 and the wounding of 24 Australian soldiers.

First erected in 1969 during 6 RAR's second tour, the original cross was removed sometime after the fall of Saigon in 1975, and is now in the Bảo tàng Đồng Nai (Đồng Nai Province Museum). It was replaced by a replica cross in the late 1980s.

In the background in this lower photo is Nui Dat Hill, or "SAS Hill", named for the SAS, which had its main base camp at the Task Force base.

The Battle of Long Tan took place on 18th August 1966 in a rubber plantation in Phuoc Tuy Province, South Vietnam. It initially involved 108 Australians from 6 RAR's D Coy and up to 2,500 Viet Cong (275 Regt) and North Vietnamese (D445 Provincial Mobile Bn and one or two other battalions). Supported by Anzac and US artillery and two UH-1B Iroquois helicopters from No 9 Sqn RAAF, and then reinforced by 6 RAR's A Coy (mounted in M113 APCs from 1 APC Sqn) and B Coy, the Australians won a decisive victory. August 2016 marks the 20th anniversary of the Battle.

Lost "Crab Day" memorial plaque

"This is a plea for help in locating the whereabouts of the "Crab Day" memorial plaque that was dedicated to the two 21st Intake Apprentices (P.K. Russell and A.J.T. (Jo) Pearce) who lost their lives on Crab Day 1968. As far as can be remembered, there was a flag

pole, a small gun and a plaque erected between two of the (then) C Coy huts near the top of the road that led to the northern end of the Parade Ground.

It appears that the memorial was disassembled during the move to Bonegilla in 1982/3 and that the plaque was relocated to the stairwell at C Coy HQ at Latchford Barracks. It was last seen around 1994. Current evidence are the four holes where the screws were on that stairwell, but there is no trace of the plaque. Anyone who can remember what happened to the plaque after 1994, or can shed any light on its whereabouts, is requested to contact any member of the Committee. You may remain anonymous."

Website review - Monument Australia

In the August 2015 edition, I included an article on the UNSW, Australian Centre for the Study of Armed Conflict and Society Website, which highlights the activities in South Vietnam between 1966 and 1971, focusing on the combat operations of the 1st Australian Task Force. In this edition, I draw your attention to a very interesting site with a much wider focus. The Monument Australia Website (www.monumentaustralia.org.au) lists Australian public monuments and memorials. The site focuses only on public monuments and memorials and not private ones. There is also a Monument Australia app for Apple and Android (\$2.49 for the app via iTunes). It has a powerful search capability, allowing specific (keyword) searches plus various filters to narrow the view. As at 5th February 2016, there were 27,324 monuments recorded on the site.

The reason for mentioning this site is because, of course, all three Apprentices-related memorials are included. A keyword search for "Apprentice" finds 24 monuments, including: "Army Apprentices School" and "Australian Army Apprentices Memorial". Results for a search on "Balcombe" include the "United States Marines Memorial Gates". When I found this site, there were no photos for any of these Memorials, but thanks to Frank Poole, there is now a great set of photos of the Australian Army Apprentices Memorial at Bandiana and I have provided photos of the Memorial Gates, the Parade Ground storyboards and plaques, and Mace Oval.

"Just in time"

This is a warning to all "fit" and "indestructible" soldiers and is based on my recent experience.

I had an ECG as part of my annual check-up. My doctor was not quite happy with the result and asked if I had experienced chest pains. I said, "NO," but THEN thought, "I do get an ache around my neck when I walk up a slope or exercise too much".

Two days later, I saw a cardiologist who, after an ultrasound, sent me home with instructions to rest and next morning I was to be back for an angiogram. While waiting for discharge from day surgery, a surgeon dashed in and said he had just come out of surgery and had scheduled me for a heart valve replacement in four days' time and would come back when he was finished operating and explain.

On his return, he went through the percentages of what could go wrong and I responded by saying that that resulted in a 12.5% chance of something going wrong. He replied that I had 100% chance of dying in the next 12-18 months. He didn't even give me the option of not having the operation!!

The procedure was brought forward a day and, on waking, I had no pains and very little discomfort, but a beautiful cut the full length of my sternum, qualifying me for the "zipper club". Healing went well and, apart from tiring easily, which will pass, I feel fine and better than I have felt for some time.

The lesson to learn from this is to recognise and have checked any chest or neck pain BEFORE it becomes a



heart attack. Insist on a proper check; an ECG isn't always a reliable check and relies on the skill of the doctor in interpreting the results. Don't be like me and ignore the ache/pain, putting it down to ageing and lack of fitness. I was lucky and had a great GP.

Heart attack warning signs

The symptoms of a heart attack can include:

- Pain or discomfort in the centre of the chest
- Pain or discomfort in the arms, left shoulder, elbows, jaw or back
- Shortness of breath
- Nausea or vomiting
- Dizziness or fainting
- Cold sweats
- Becoming pale
