Disappointingly I have received not one response. I am sure someone must be aware of some information that may assist so please, regardless of how vague it may be, let me know what you know.

This is our last Newsletter before our Association's next Annual General Meeting and in keeping with our Constitution the following Committee positions must stand down prior to elections being conducted for appointment to a two year term: President, Secretary, Heritage Officer (currently vacant) and three (3) Ordinary Committee Members (currently held by Robert (Bob) Clarke 22nd VM, Wayne Davis 50th EF & John Culbert 18th C&J). All those standing down may accept nomination for re-election for a further term however, please remember as mentioned in my previous report, all but two who are due to stand down are over the age of seventy (70). Further to this when we went to a Web-based membership register we determined the most appropriate identifier is individual's regimental/service number (NOT PMKeyS) as this will not change, whereas email addresses often do and not everyone is diligent in keeping their contacts up to date with changes.

When writing to us can you please include your regimental number. This helps greatly in identifying who you are. This was highlighted recently when we had fellows with the same name and similar email addresses causing



confusion for those coordinating our reunion registrations. A few more keystrokes will make life easier for our volunteers.

Postscript

Since providing the above to our Newsletter Editor I was saddened to learn from Terry Dillon, 11th Intake F&T that 342773 Ronald (Ron) Edward James COOK, 11th Blacksmith died in the early hours of Tuesday 11th July last. Ron collapsed during the previous weekend and was rushed to Frankston hospital on life support. He did not regain consciousness.

An extract from the 1958/59 Army Apprentices' School journal advises "... congratulations go to Apprentice RSM Cook on winning the Regimental Training Medal. The youngest apprentice in the 11th Intake, he won the respect of all who knew him."

Ron returned to Balcombe in the mid 1960s as Sgt Blacksmith Instructor, later transferring to the civilian staff and, with the demise of blacksmith training in the Army, he went on to instruct in Metal Fabrication, retiring as Senior Instructor (SI) in 1982.

Ron was a long-standing member of our Association and had arranged to attend our approaching 75th Anniversary Reunion. On behalf of our members and all Apprentices who had the privilege of knowing Ron Cook I extend our sincerest condolences to Ron's widow Lyn. May he rest in peace.

Alan Gostelow enlisted as a 14th Intake Vehicle Mechanic Army Apprentice in 1959. He served in South Vietnam with 2nd Advanced Ordnance Depot from 9 Jul 1970 to 8 Jul 1971. He also served in the Indonesian-Malaysian confrontation, serving with the 28th Commonwealth Infantry Brigade. Alan retired in 1984.

He was deployed to Malaysia during the Indonesian-Malaysian confrontation, where he served in the 28th Commonwealth Infantry

Brigade as a private soldier for Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (RAEME) and trained as a recovery mechanic in the ready reaction force.

Vietnam Veterans Vigil

In the last edition (<u>TAA Vol 5 Iss 9 May 2023</u>) were details of the Vietnam Veterans Vigil (VVV) which includes, on 3 August 2023 at 1100 hrs, services to be held at every grave or commemorative plaque site across the nation and overseas for Australian servicemen who died in Vietnam. The services may be attended by anyone who wishes to do so. Other related events include:

- 1) 3 August 2023 at 0530 hrs Dawn Service at the Australian Vietnam Forces National Memorial (AVFNM), Anzac Parade, Canberra
- 2) 3 August 2023 Dusk Service Stand Down at Birkhill Cemetery, Scotland for LCPL Robert BUCHAN, 12 Pl, D Coy, 6 RAR (2nd Tour), whose patrol was ambushed
- 3) 18 August 2023 from 1000 hrs national Commemorative Service at the AVFNM, televised by the ABC latest details on planning and registering your attendance are <u>here</u>.

Six Army Apprentices paid the supreme sacrifice in Vietnam from 21 February 1967 to 27 October 1971. Their names are listed on plaques near the Chapel of St Peter, Bonegilla, at the Army Apprentices Memorial, Bandiana, and on our Website's *Honour Board*.

They are also listed below, as extracted on 20 July 2023 from the KIA page on the VVV Website https://vvv.org.au/523KIA/, to inform readers of the locations of the graves or commemorative plaque sites for these Apprentices. The Welfare Officer:

- supports members in determining their welfare and other Commonwealth and State Government entitlements
- by helping them locate organisations who may assist
- liaises with similar service bodies on welfare matters
- on advice of the death of members, ensures that information is correct and that NOKs are being cared for, sends condolences, and advises the Secretary of updates required on the Website
- on advice of members in hospital, sick or otherwise indisposed, arranges visits to ensure his/her welfare.

Planning ahead

As we are all ageing, and the average age constantly grows (of those alive), we need to be prepared for transitioning into aged care or even for our demise. Planning ahead is highly recommended and there are a number of actions we need to consider:

- **Financial Planning**, to help take the worry out of transitioning into aged care, there are many organisations that can provide guidance. Most of these charge for their services so care is required to make sure you get value for money. The Welfare Officer can assist and can provide a document that provides details on: Powers of Attorney or Guardianship, Wills, Advanced Health Care Plans, and DVA support services.
- **DVA Planning Ahead kit**, publications to help veterans and their families prepare for bereavement, including:
 - * **Personal Information Sheet D8729** to record personal details to ensure there is a record after someone passes away. The form is strictly for reference only and is not to be sent back to DVA.
 - * Medical Details of Veteran D8730 to record medical details to ensure there is a record to aid in a War Widows pension claim after a veteran passes away.
- <u>Documenting Your Affairs A resource kit to assist you and your loved ones</u>, has been prepared by the Vietnam Veterans Outer Eastern Melbourne (VVOEM) Sub-branch.

Vale notices

The untimely passing of a former Army Apprentice is always a sad occasion. It is important when notifying of the passing that we are clear about the details of the notice. Whilst Facebook posts draw our attention to the passing of Apprentices, occasionally there is insufficient information to assist in maintaining the Apprentices nominal roll.

In their Honour - Kenneth Leonard Everett

The life story about Kenneth Leonard Everett, briefly summarised below, was told by his close friend, Jim Hislop and can be read in full in the Soldier On Winter Journal 2023 (*here*).

"Ken was born on 19 May 1933, in the UK. As a young boy during World War 2, he developed a profound sense of admiration for the pilots of the RAF. When he left school in the late 1940's, he entered apprentice training as an Instrument Maker and, when called up for National Service in 1951, he was allocated to the RAF as an Airframe Fitter. At the end of his National Service, he re-enlisted and completed officer and then pilot training. He left the RAF as a Squadron Leader and became an instructor in engineering and obtained a degree in civil engineering.

Ken and his wife arrived in Albury in 2009 and became Australian citizens in August 2011. Jim met him in about 2014. Ken had a great love for all things military and an amazing ability to conduct research into any topic put to him. Jim used Ken's skills to help with research into the DFRDB scheme and a wide range of military historical topics that fitted into Ken's own interests of politics and history. The things Ken valued most in life were his love for his wife and helping people with their problems.

"As his own transition from the RAF was very poorly managed, he asked me what he could do to help Australian servicemembers leaving the military. Through my work in ex-service organisations, I told him that Soldier On was the organisation that assisted with veterans when transitioning. Within a couple of days, he and his wife had new wills drawn up to reflect their wishes of making a bequest to Soldier On," says Jim. In addition to Ken's bequest to Soldier on he also left \$120,000 to the children's ward of Albury/Wodonga Health. Not bad for a lad who commenced his military career as an Apprentice.

Ken passed away on 11 June 2021 in Albury. "We pay respects to Ken for the sacrifices he made for our peace and liberty through serving and supporting. We remember his life and continue to enable veterans and their families to thrive in his honour.""


Membership matters




the crowd, much to everyone's amusement, got a lot of giggles from the ranks.




May 2023 competition solution (SPAASSM PhI, Image 00487)

Q: "What's the difference in calibre of these two weapons?"

A: Our President, Keith Lowe, 22nd Intake Fitter & Turner provided this detailed response.

"The gun to the top of the photo is a Vickers .303 medium machine gun. The .303 British round has a projectile diameter of .311 inch in the main, but some .312 inch also existed depending on the factory of production. The barrel minor diameter (over the rifling lands) is .303 inch thus giving the .303 calibre. The weapon in the lower part

> of the photograph is an M60 GPMG in 7.62mm

History

Army Apprentice College Chepstow, UK

This year, 2023, marks 100 years since the beginning of the British Army's Apprentice Scheme. As we know, the Australian Army Apprentice Scheme was modelled on the British system, following some 25 years later. The extracts below appear similar to our own history in some ways (bolded).

"At the beginning of the 1920's, there was growing concerns that a major depression was on the horizon, countries were still suffering the economic effect of WW1 and there were little monies left to train the workforce so an innovative approach was needed. This approach came in the form of a new facility to train young men within the Army, this gave a two-fold result, replacement soldiers for those lost during the War and **tradesmen to provide the technical skills required for the new mechanised Army**. This was the beginning of a new era and it started with The Central Training School for Boys at a temporary home at Buller Barracks in Aldershot, but work was required to facilitate this plan and so soldiers from the Royal Engineers supervised 500 workmen in clearing up the site and making preparations for the forthcoming changes.

Accommodated by No1 Corps Depot, RASC, based at Buller Barracks and under the command of Lt Col VTR Ford, DSO, The York and Lancaster Regiment, No1 Group, totalling 105 boys was formed as part of the Central Training School for Boys. They reported to Buller Barracks, Aldershot, on September 25th 1923, and this date became known as the official Foundation Day. However considerable difficulties became apparent, **little available workshop space, few stores or tools, some very wintery weather and, finally, an outbreak of an epidemic disease**.

After Christmas leave, No2 Group arrived in Aldershot and on the February 28th 1924, the School, now numbering 250 all ranks, departed its temporary accommodation and established itself at Beachley Camp, four miles from the market town of Chepstow in Monmouthshire."

"Almost the final chapter in Beachley Camps history began in 1924 when the newly formed Army Technical School arrived from Aldershot to begin **training in Trades, Education and Military Skills ready after 3 years to join the Regular Army as highly skilled young men who were destined to become the future leaders of the new Army**.

Beachley Camp remained an Apprentice Training Establishment **until 1994 when it was decided that there was no requirement for Boy Soldiers in the Army**. Throughout those 70 years changes took place, name changes, duration of Training and career development opportunities. Beachley Camp has played a very large part in the history of the local area and is still iconic in it's being. The Camp is still occupied by the Army and currently is Home to 1st Battalion Rifles, a fully operational unit with a proud record and also a very good friend to BOBA [Beachley Old Boys Association] and the Heritage Centre.

Perhaps not the correct manner in which to remember the Camp but **that fateful decision in 1992/1994 to** dispense with Apprentice Training of Boy Soldiers has been shown to be an error, however those thousands of Boys that passed through the Beachley Gate are proud to have enjoyed the opportunity given them."





Timeline of events, Australian Army Apprentices Scheme and Schools, and the Australian Army Apprentices Association





Major change to Defence trades training

"Thousands of sailors, soldiers and aviators will be trained in technical trades under a five-year \$300 million contract with Wodonga TAFE.

In a significant change to trades training across Defence, the new Joint Technical Trades and Training Services contract supports the development of qualified and experienced Australian Defence Force (ADF) personnel in multiple locations across Australia.

More than 100 accredited and non-accredited courses will be delivered for the construction, engineering, mechanical, electrical and electronics trades, which will benefit over 2,000 students per year.

The new contract will also enable thousands of sailors, soldiers and aviators to further develop their skills in technical trades in locations where they work and live.

Navy's Commodore of Training, John Stavridis, said the continued development of a highly-skilled workforce is critical to achieving workforce goals and supporting our people.



"For the first time, trade-specific training will be delivered flexibly where and when it is needed. It will expand to support the growth of the Australian Defence Force and importantly, will be rolled out across a number of locations to take the training to our people," Commodore Stavridis said.

Army's Director General of Training and Doctrine, Brigadier Glenn Ryan said the new partnership is an important step towards an integrated ADF.

"The partnership with TAFE Wodonga has been set up with the future in mind, focused on preparing our people for a rich and rewarding career in the ADF."

Defence is committed to investing in ongoing education and skills development opportunities for our personnel throughout their careers.

The new contract will commence in November 2023."
