"It is with great sadness we advise of the passing of a true legend of our Corps BRIG Bert Barker, today (17 June 2024) in Melbourne, aged 102.

Until recently was a resident in aged care at Banora Point on the Gold Coast, moving back to Melbourne to be closer to family, he was focused on making sure his wife Nona was settled in the Victorian retirement village with their daughter. They would have celebrated their 80th wedding anniversary on the 15th July and Nona herself, a WWII veteran, turns 100 on the 31st of October this year.

BRIG Bert belongs to a rare cohort of servicemen because he was an original member of our proud Corps at our foundation in 1942. He served in WWII on operations in PNG and through his many postings, his various commands, training and staff appointments over 33 years' service, it is clear he made a huge contribution to the Corps, the Army and the ADF. He served as Colonel Commandant 1 Military District from 1980 to 1984 before retiring.



Bert was RAQ Member No.591. He received a Chairman's Award in 2019 and in 2022 was awarded 'Honorary Life Membership' of the RAEME Association Queensland for his significant contribution to our Corps over a lifetime.

Extract from [RAEME] Corps Status Update (as adapted from the Corps RSM's monthly report) Courtesy RAEME in ACTion May 2024 (RAEME ACT Monthly Newsletter)

"During my 15 months as Corps RSM I have had the pleasure of addressing many promotion courses over the last 15 months. There are common themes in the questions I receive, which [are] often emotive and not always based in fact and I would strongly encourage leadership to review my points at the link [not provided]. It is our responsibility as leaders to ensure we are up-to-date on policy so that our tradies are correctly informed.

- 1. Why can't we all get a bonus, this will encourage me to stay longer?
- 2. What is the Corps doing to about retention?
- 3. Why don't I spend more time doing my trade, and how is the HOC going to fix this?
- 4. How is the HOC going to help Recovery gain more skills and be able to recover vehicles on major highways/roads?
- 5. Will HOC be pushing units to conduct more PME / trade training (recovery) in places like the CTA etc?...



To answer [the first of] the questions above:

- 1. Bonuses are a short-term fix that is actually a terrible business model as shown in the Harvard Business Review ... Historically members that have been offered a bonus, stay for the short term, once time is met, ask for another bonus or leave anyway. This isn't sustainable.
 - What we should be talking to is the actual conditions of service we receive: Base salary CFN \$84,710 \$89,203 depending on your trade
 - Gym membership for yourself \$800/\$1000
 - Subsided housing (based on average rent in a capital city) \$17,000 HPAS \$16,000 to buy a house
 - DHOAS, 40% of your house interest repayments up to your loan limit HPSEA sell / buy costs covered on posting
 - Medical & dental for you (insurance /average cost per family) \$3,000 ADFFH \$800 per dependant per year
 - 25 days paid leave (5 more than your civilian counterparts) \$1,000
 - 16.5% Super, which is above industry counterparts
 - From a very basic POV the soldier receives ~\$102,000. This equates to 15% more than the average technician receives at Toyota. Just because you don't see money in your fortnightly pay, doesn't mean you don't earn more money than you see."



This is an extract from the BonTR update from 22 May 2024:

Directions

- Coming from the east. Go past the Railway Station to the stop sign diagonally opposite Super IGA, turn left on Mitchell Hwy to Cunnamulla, travel 15km to Percival Rd on your right. Go all the way (4km) to Magpie Lane front gate, another 4km on the formed road to the camp on the hill.



A dinner was held at the Dava Hotel on 25th April, as well as another get together at the Portsea Hotel on the night of the 26th April.





History

Army Tattoo, Sydney, November 1955

From Harry Cole, 7th Intake Vehicle Mechanic

It was 1955 and the 2 Base Workshop Moorebank provided a Harley Davidson motorcycle stunt team for the Army Tattoo that they used to run each year in Sydney.

The majority of the team were of course ex-Apprentices and of the 7th Intake there were John Heppell (Electrician), and Wally Cove, Bernie Sullivan, Doc Lorger and myself (Vehicle Mechanics), and probably one or two others I have forgotten.

Also in the senior intakes taking part were Neil Toyer $[2^{nd}]$ Intake VM - RIP], James (Mauler) Morrison $[5^{th}]$ Intake VM - RIP], George Stone $[5^{th}]$ Intake VM], Charlie Hill $[3^{rd}]$

Intake Carpenter & Joiner], and Ken Roughley [6th Intake VM – RIP].



The photograph is of the late John Heppell and myself prior to going into the first night events at Sydney Showground.

These were great days never to be seen again unless you go to Edinburgh Castle in Scotland.

22 February 1958 – opening of the Matthews Club, Balcombe – and the Australian War Memorial

For those Balcombe Apprentices (from 1958 onwards), the Matthews Club at Balcombe was named by David Matthews after his father, CAPT Lionel Colin Matthews GC MC (15 August 1912 – 2 March 1944). The Club was officially opened on 30 May 1958 by LTGEN HG Edgar CB CBE, GOC Southern Command.



CAPT Matthews was the most-decorated officer in the Royal Australian Corps of Signals (RA Sigs) during WWII. He was awarded the Military Cross while in captivity in Singapore, was executed at Kuching, Sarawak, in March 1944 and, after the war, was posthumously awarded the George Cross in recognition of his gallant and distinguished services while a POW in Japanese hands.

The Last Post Ceremony commemorating the service of (VX24597) Captain Lionel Colin Matthews GC MC, 8th Division Signals, Second AIF, Second World War, tells us that "David Matthews received his father's Military Cross from the Governor-General, William McKell, at Government House, Adelaide, in late November 1947, and also received his George Cross from the Governor of South Australia, LTGEN Sir Willoughby Norrie, in Adelaide on 4 October 1949. Lionel Matthews' George Cross, Military Cross and service medals are displayed in the Hall of Valour at the Australian War Memorial (AWM) in Canberra." [https://www.awm.gov.au/collection/C2126228]

The latest AWM Wartime Magazine, Issue #106 (the final to be printed in its current form Note 1 below), includes an article "Daring Deeds: Captain Lionel Matthews" by Author Kate Johnston, Assistant Curator, Military Heraldry and Technology, 8 April 2024. She discusses donation of Matthews' George Cross and then covers his service history from the CMF in 1935, the RAN Volunteer Reserve, and 3rd Division Signals, AMF, and to his secondment in 1940 to the AIF 8 Division Signals as a lieutenant. He commanded the 'Eddy' Wireless Operating section, responsible for artillery brigade communications. In February 1941, they arrived in Malacca, Malaya.

Matthews earned the Military Cross for maintaining communications while under heavy fire and bombardment during the Japanese invasion in December 1941. As a Captain, he was among more than 15,000 Australian soldiers captured at the fall of Singapore. In July 1942, he was sent to Borneo and imprisoned at Sandakan, where he directed an underground intelligence organisation and co-ordinated: the provision of medical supplies and weapons deliveries from the Philippines, escapes, and readiness for an uprising against the Japanese. When, in July 1943, the intelligence network was betrayed to their captors, Matthews chose to remain with his men and submitted to arrest rather than escaping. Subjected to brutal interrogation, he never gave away his mates, eventually being sentenced to execution by a Japanese military court in Kuching in March 1944. He was allowed to choose his own means of execution, firing squad, which occurred that day. He was buried at Kuching but reinterred at Labuan at War's end.

D-Day commemorations at the Australian War Memorial

Thursday 6 June 2024 marked the 80th anniversary of the Allied landings along the Normandy coastline, better known as D-Day. D-Day marked the first step in the Allied liberation of Europe from Nazi occupation. Involving the largest armada of ships ever assembled, and more than 10,000 supporting aircraft, D–Day was the culmination of years of planning and preparation.

Australians played a small but important role as part of the Allied forces that participated in D–Day. Approximately 3,200 Australians participated in the D-Day landings on 6 June 1944. Some 500 members of the Royal Australian Navy served on attachment with the Royal Navy. A small number of Australian soldiers served on the ground with the British Army.

Our nation's main contribution came in the air, where approximately 1,000 Australian airmen flew with Royal Australian Air Force squadrons, and a further 1,800 operated on attachment to the Royal Air Force.

Thirteen Australians were killed on 6 June while participating in Operation Overlord, and hundreds more were killed over the course of the campaign, flying in support of ground forces.

On the eve of the 80th anniversary of the D-Day invasion, the Last Post Ceremony commemorated the service and sacrifice of Pilot Officer Colin Douglas Bell, who survived D-Day but was killed in action off the coast of Holland about three months later.

At 9 pm on the D-Day anniversary, Australian piper, Stephen Ladd, of the Canberra City Pipes & Drums, played the bagpipes at the Stone of Remembrance at the Memorial as part of a global tribute across the capital cities of Allied countries involved in D-Day to commemorate the 80th anniversary.

The name of the first Australian to be killed on Juno Beach on D-Day has also been added to the Normandy Memorial wall in the UK. Sub Lieutenant Richard Pirrie was nominated by Australian War Memorial Director, Matt Anderson, who was asked by the United Kingdom Defence Ministry to select an Australian to be remembered at the Normandy Memorial.

The Pirrie family recently purchased Richard Pirrie's medals and donated them to the Australian War Memorial before heading to the UK for the dedication ceremony at the Normandy Memorial Wall on the 80th anniversary of the D-Day invasion.

INTERFET - 25 years

"On 15 September 1999, the UN Security Council authorised the formation of a multinational force known as INTERFET. It was headed by Australia, with a mission to:

- * restore peace and security in East Timor
- * protect and support UNAMET in carrying out its tasks
- * facilitate humanitarian assistance operations.

INTERFET began landing in East Timor on 20 September 1999 with the agreement of the Indonesian Government. By November 1999, 22 nations had contributed to INTERFET, including the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, the United States and Canada.

The Australian operations were known as Operation Stabilise and Operation Warden. The Australian Government sent about 5,500 service people to East Timor as part of its contribution to INTERFET. This was the largest deployment of Australian troops since the Vietnam War. Major General Sir Peter Cosgrove commanded the multinational force for 5 months until February 2000.



Australians from the Special Air Service Regiment (SASR), New Zealanders from the New Zealand Special Air Service (NZSAS) and a troop from the British Special Boat Service (SBS) formed Response Force (RESPFOR). They conducted vehicle patrols into Dili and secured the port before the 3rd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (3 RAR) and other forces arrived.


About 10 AFP members who had been with the first UNAMET mission returned to East Timor with INTERFET under the UNAMET banner. They carried out monitoring and advisory duties. They would later transition to the United Nations Transitional Administration in East Timor (UNTAET), the transition mission, when it was established in October 1999."



Part 2 – page 4 (next page) was an Army Career Planning Chart. How did your career match this?


Page 5 – "The Army as a Career" listed the three training groups available: Tradesmen, Clerks and Musicians.

Part 3 – pages 6, 8 and 10 included photos of Apprentices in training. Pages 7, 9 and 11 detailed the course and curriculum for all three training groups.

Part 4 – page 12 included photos of Apprentices in various sports and other activities, described on page 13. Page 14 included miscellaneous photos such as the range of uniforms, the Matthews Club, religious training and the RAP.





Part 5 – pages 15 and 17 described pay and conditions at Balcombe, with a photo of a "leave bus" on page 17. Page 16 featured a photo of an Apprentice undergoing weapon training, supervised by Regimental Training Instructor Bill Gammel. Page 18 included photos of the Apprentice Musician Band and a Graduation Parade.

Part 6 – pages 19 and 20 provided details on eligibility requirements, period of engagement, service obligations, closing date for entry, and how to apply for entrance.

Captain Kevin Yarker might have been an Apprentice but for the fact that he broke the law on the way to the careers office. Aged 15 in 1971, he was fined for unlicensed riding of a scooter and, as he had to pay it off, he couldn't join the British Army with an outstanding fine. Kevin did join in 1973 and has received all four of Queen Elizabeth's Silver (1977), Golden (2002), Diamond (2012) and Platinum (2022) Jubilee Medals. He is one of only two British soldiers to do so, having served for almost 50 years.
